With all that has taken place in the past few years and the constant bombardment of rumors generated out there recently, it has been challenging or impossible to get moving on a positive level of progress. Funny thing to me is the lack of people trying to get their questions answered by those that know what is happening. It seems a good story is much better than fact and much more interesting for sure. We are moving forward and we would like to spend our time working in that direction, not in dispelling rumors that frankly become quite hurtful. Train Mountain has been built by Quentin and the efforts of many volunteers. Along with Quentin's staff and family, the accumulated efforts are responsible for making it the longest miniature hobby railroad in the world. FTM has seen a place of greatness here; Carl Vanderspek has spent a lot of money to make us bigger; now we have to make it better. The railroaders that come and are involved are what make a longer railroad special.

Long overdue is a thank you to Ken Stanfield for sending us a new type of insulated rail joiner. Rail Joiners of the slip type work very well for us but not in the insulated joints. Ken developed an insulated slip joiner for use on his railroad and has had great success with it. Last year some of these were constructed and a few modifications made out in the Backshop and then put to use; I haven't had any negative feedback but I did get some positive responses including thank yous for making it faster and eliminating holes to drill. As you can see in the picture the "Stanfield Joiner "is



bolted together and straddles a tie (this is made possible by welding 2 tubes on the bottom and splitting the

joiner end to end). To insulate, it uses 2 small sheets of polyester film that wrap around the rail below the head and clamp in place by tightening the joiner bolts. Between the rail ends, it is still necessary to put the plastic insulator.

In the past a plastic or fiberglass fish plate was bolted to the sides of the rail to insulate the joint which required 4 holes to be drilled in each joint. The joint had little to no structural strength so if the tie moved or the rail expanded too much the joint was broken. In many cases when spring thaw came, it was necessary to replace many of the crossing joints for this reason. I hope that this new method will solve some of those issues. I know it is simpler to put in and Richard and Paul like it. Thanks Ken for sharing this innovation with us.

As you know Paul Aragon is fighting cancer. He has gone through radiation treatment and will start chemo next week. While his spirits are good, your support is important as well.

We are all thinking about Steve Panzik also as he goes through by-pass surgery in Seattle. Get well soon Steve.
