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FROM THE MANAGER The latest information

The scheduled meets are over for the year and what do we get but 3 inches of snow overnight! Nice way to do things when there is so much outside work to do yet. At least we can get some burning done now and clear some of the brush piles you all made over the summer (I think we will be burning Texas Bob and Billie's area all winter because they have so many piles).

I always say we get better with practice and I think we hit the highest rung on the ladder again this year with the Halloween Party! Thanks to Dale and Veronica Taylor - the entertainment was great! For those of you that don't know what I mean, Dale tells one joke and does it very well, but when you put the two of them together they do jokes, songs, food, dance lessons, karaoke, music and all the things that make for good times. We had a wonderful group of folks in attendance and had a great time. I was told we were going still around 3AM! Sonya and Sarah did a great job decorating again this year; they added a number of creepy things like rats and spiders in the bathroom (I think they enjoy scaring me too much!). Thanks to all who made this a great party.

A short note on Containerville, we have had our inspection on the second set of foundation blocks and our electrician will be out to run the proper conduits through the open passageway between containers 10 and 11 this week sometime. I have some information to pass along to phase 2 container folks and will get that done in the next couple weeks. This information will detail costs of the containers at present and what our options are.

It appears that the list of Chairpersons for the upcoming Triennial is filling quickly. I am impressed to see the amount of talent and knowledge that will be in charge of the various departments. Your support of the Chief Volunteer is very much appreciated and respected; your efforts will once again strengthen and improve the hobby.

Ron and Caroline are busy getting some refurbishing work underway on some of the first buildings they built here over ten years ago. Their techniques have proven that you can build a 2-inch scale building and get it to last for a long time. Art and Charlie have been busy in the main yard leveling tracks and aligning them as well. They have had 2 loads (about 26 yards) of stone, as Charlie calls it, hauled in by Peggy and they have worked it all in. Jerry is working on the rebuild of a Railroad Supply GP 40 and making progress.

We are busy with road work, brush burning, storing stuff inside for winter, etc. We are also getting busy

with the forestry work for the winter season; we need to remove the brush from about 330 acres this winter to fulfill our contract with the Ag Department. Richard finished the dirt work on the Cooperstown Connector between the long tunnel and Central Station last week and electrical ditches are open for some new power to run a control tower in the area of the number one switch to the passenger station.

Camping at Train Mountain has become very popular and we are working to make improvements in infrastructure and in the campgrounds themselves. I have been receiving numerous requests and guestions concerning camping next year; first, the Conditional Use Permit must allow campgrounds and licenses must be acquired, next the purpose of the campground will be defined and rules adopted for those uses. At this time, Blue Caboose is for workers here for extended periods of time and 6-Acre Camparound is for tent campers and small tent trailers, and finally, South Meadow is open for any type of camping. We have tried to keep it simple and maintain the informal use of these camping areas but have realized that the use is too heavy for the "good old days" type of management and we will now have to install rules and adhere to them. As soon as possible, with the help from some of our frequent campers, we will publish those rules for all to see. If you have any suggestions please get them to me as soon as possible.

The singing was just as ahhhh, just as ahhhh anyhow it was just like last year!




And now presenting the latest Chiloquin singing sensations the 'Broomettes!
