Always the raking! I have had some news "3rd party" but I understand Frank Steuer may not be here this summer (health problems) that means we will have to have more folks to haul stuff to the burn pit. I wish Frank well and I'll miss having to dodge out of his way all the time!



It won't be long now until we are the Train Mountain that you folks see when you come during the summer months.




