
A couple of years ago Tom Watson took on **February** the task of putting out The Mountain Gazette each month in addition to his regular

While the visitation of the National Garden Railroad Convention mentioned above is still in its planning stages, we need to be aware of the implications that this visitation may mean. We will need lots of volunteers to handle all of the support functions such as security, parking, shuttles (both rail and golf cart), and docents to assist Mort and Denny at the garden. This will be a great event for them and for Train Mountain.

Plastic Ties Used at Train Mountain

The largest element of any railroad is the track. Train Mountain is no exception as there are 36 plus miles of track on 2200 acres of pine forest. The track is preassembled in 10-foot track panels in the TMRR Track Shop and laid by our volunteer corps. Each panel has 30 ties, 60 tie plates and 120 track screws. By my calculations, we have already laid approximately 540,000 ties (or sleepers as the Brits and Aussies would say) making them the most significant element of the Train Mountain Railroad.

If our ties were made to 1/8 scale, as most of our model trains are intended to be, those ties would be 1"x1"x12". While this would be adequate for 1/8 scale equipment, our passengers and train crews are full -size people and require a more substantial track structure.

The first track that was laid at Train Mountain was rough cut 2"x3" x16" Port Orford Cedar ties. These were considered the best material available at the time. They had a life expectancy of 25 years. The biggest problem with them is UV damage causing cracks and splitting. This damage makes the ties unable to hold the screws and the track will not stay in gauge. We still have a substantial amount of track on these Cedar ties that has been in use for up to 30 years.

In 1998, the first plastic ties were purchased and became the standard for TMRR track construction. Recycled plastic products had limited availability and required them to be made to order. It was decided to keep with 2"x3"x16" tie size. These dimensions after much trial and error seemed to work the best. The 16" length prevented the track from tipping in the ballast. The 3" depth gave the ties plenty of grip in the ballast. All the jigs in the track shop were designed with these dimensions so the tooling did not to have to be modified. Having tie stock manufactured required the purchase of molding dies by TMR. These dies were used through 2018. This year we had to purchase a new set of dies as the original dies were worn-out. We recently received our first tie shipment from the manufacturer using the new molds. These ties come in 96" lengths, which will keep the track shop busy for the rest of the winter.

Tie spacing is 2" or 4" center to center. Train Mountain believes in being conservative in the spacing of the ties. As large passenger loads tend to exceed the axle loads of the locomotives in most cases. TMRR maximum axel load is 400lbs per axel. The ties are routed in a special jig and custom built router machine. The routing allows the tie plate an place to be seated and limits side to side shifting. The tie plates do allow the foot of the rail to slip during thermal expansion and contraction.

In the newest Triennial video, there are also numerous scenes of the Track Shop in action, featuring Dennis Ward and Charlie Bill Schubert. From the ED: They are also the driving force behind FIXING any major issues in between our meets. They have also undertaken many special jobs such as relaying Midway Circle switches and track with steel on plastic ties.





Train Mountain Museum and Rail Tours

Train Mountain is unique in so many ways, and a record holder as the world's longest miniature railroad in the Guinness World Records. Over the past year we've been getting more attention as a tourist attraction in Southern Oregon. Yes, that's a good thing since the visitors not only have a good experience, they leave donations that are necessary for the future financial viability of Train Mountain.

To enhance the visitor experience, we're establishing a visitor office at Central Station to alleviate the visitor congestion that occurs in the main office. The existing office will remain to handle all matters for members, as in the past. To add to the visitor experience, the new office will have the decor of an old train station with as many appurtenances as we can find, and fit in the room. The former Santa Fe room will be used for the visitor office since it has direct access to the train platform, and direct access to the Hall of Flags, the Company Store, and to the outside handicap restrooms on the east side of the building via the Hall of Flags.

Some of the things we need to establish the train station ambiance are as follows:

- Office Desk, vintage if possible
- Counter, for brochures and release forms
- Magneto telephone, wall mount, or combination wall/desk, phone donated by Dick Miller
- Telegraph key and sounder, key donated by Jeff Mills
- Wall posters, safety and vintage train advertisements
- Railroad Wall Clock, Standard or Regulator
- Anything else that would add to the decor of an old time train station.
- Volunteers to setup and staff the visitor office

We anticipate the visitor office will be a work in progress, as is the case with nearly all projects at Train Mountain, but we plan to have the office functional before the coming visitor season. Barbara Ward will be recruiting and scheduling **volunteers** for the office. If you can set aside some time for this valuable income producing function, please contact Barbara Ward, or she may be contacting you. Without **volunteers**, Train Mountain would not be viable.

The Rail Tour Committee has developed a certification and training program for tour train crews and will, likewise, need **volunteer** tour train crews so visitors can enjoy the full benefit of a visit to Train Mountain. Remember these are **TOURS** not TRAIN RIDES. We want to do this safely and still have some fun doing it. Thanks for all of your continued support.

Train Mountain has an extensive weed control program. We have a dedicated weed control train as well as a dedicated weed control 'gator. For the past several seasons Boyd Butler and Bill Kludt have operated the equipment. Now both members feel that the equipment is sufficiently well developed that the general membership can participate.

The weed management season coincides with the TM organized meets season: the Spring Awakening Meet until the Fall Colors Meet. Generally one pass over the railroad per work week is sufficient. Different volunteers can arrange to do one or more sessions.

Members interested in participating should contact Boyd Butler directly. You will receive thorough on-the-job training and Boyd will be available to provide supplies, parts and repairs.

This is a neat opportunity to contribute to TM in a big way while running an interesting train. Arrangements to use a TM loco on the train are possible. You get to see all the railroad while contributing a much needed service.

Gazette PUBLICATION DEADLINE:

Submissions to the Gazette must be received by the 15th of the month of publication. The fifteenth of the month is to be the last day to submit material. Material received after the 15th of the month may be held until the following month or rejected.

SUBMISSION CRITERIA

Articles and ads may be submitted via a pdf file, MS WORD, Open Office, notepad, or similar text file attached to an email. The email SUBJECT line must include your article title and a date.

Please give each article a distinct file name with your name and a date. If everyone submits an article named "article for gazette" or something similar it will often get overwritten by another article with the same name when downloading. Articles sent as text in a email text will no longer be accepted.

Please use a common open source FONT such as ARIAL that can be displayed in all Browsers, and is easy to read. Please do NOT use the Calibri font, as we must take the time to convert it to Arial.

If your document has an embedded image, you must also include the image separately as a jpg, png, or similar image file.

Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU:

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times when the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the Back Shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through Friday. To arrange other hours visitors should call the office at 541-783-3030.

Train Mountain is a NO SMOKING Facility

During recent events, many Members and their Guests have been ignoring this policy. There are only three designated smoking areas at Train Mountain:

- (1) Outside the front of the Backshop
- (2) Outside the east door of the Hall of Flags
- (3) Outside the Motor Pool (Maintenance Building)

Due to the high fire danger at Train Mountain during the summer, we have zero tolerance for anyone smoking outside one of the designated areas.

There is NO SMOKING anywhere out on the track!

Members, Guests, and Visitors that continue to violate the Train Mountain Smoking Policy may be asked to leave.

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




cost of the video is just \$29.95, quite a bargain!


